PAUSE – don't rush on!

What might it mean for Jesus to come and stay at my house - today?

### Reflection

a GLOBAL issue: what do we do with our capital?

can a country surrender its 'comfort' agenda for the sake of relationships, for the health of the planet, for just distribution of resources?

How does our world handle its wealth?

with deceit (tax avoidance and off-shore banking for the wealthy) or with transparency;

with **power** (corporations more powerful than nations – democracy subverted) or with **mutuality**;

with **self-interest** (where the market holds sway and the bottom line is always profit, not relationships or environment) or for the **common good**;

with **pride** (having a space programme gains more brownie points than eliminating abject poverty) or with **humility**;

with **force** (military budgets and vested interests in armament industries divert funds from health and well-being of entire nations) or with **compassion**;

with **economic 'wisdom'** (corporate dividends ahead of a living wage for workers who create the wealth) or with **justice**.

Where does the nation I am part of, lack integrity?

In what ways do I participate in and benefit from the injustice of our world?

What might integrity invite me to surrender today?

#### A story from our global family:

Om Kuehn was an ordinary, but poor, woman, whose husband was an alcoholic and whose son had been murdered; a deeply sincere Buddhist, she worked hard, running a shanty 'grocery store' in her simple village.

Om Kuehn had been eagerly attending the bible study gatherings in our neighbourhood, and one evening she dropped in to share ... something she believed God had spoken to her. She had read in the gospels that Jesus calls us to forgive those who have wronged us (to forgive their debts). With this new insight, she had examined her heart and found that there was something tainting her relationships in the village. Over the years, she had extended so much credit to other families that it now amounted to hundreds of dollars (a huge amount in that little slum economy). Om Khuen realized that she felt angry and frustrated with those who owed her so much, because she would be so much further ahead in life if they paid their debts. But she also realized that those poor families were deeply ashamed of the debts they would never be able to repay, and they avoided her as much as possible. She neither wanted to feel bitter, nor to be avoided. Inspired by what she had read in the gospels, she went from family to family, and before their eyes, drew a line through their debt, declaring it forgiven. At the stroke of a pen, they were set free --- and so was she.
